- Join James Campbell in a discussion of Rhode Island's involvement with the slave trade and how history, and the telling of history, affects us today. The workshop will also explore exercises and resources designed to help you teach students about Rhode Island's involvement in the slave trade.

JAMES CAMPBELL is Associate Professor of Africana Studies and American Civilization at Brown University and serves as Chair of the Brown University Steering Committee on Slavery and Justice. He is author of *Middle Passages: African American Journeys to Africa, 1787-2005* (Penguin Press, 2006). Campbell speaks frequently to groups of secondary teachers and students across the country. He has also coordinated with Toogaloo College to create a web site, "Freedom Now!" about the history of the Mississippi freedom movement.

## *Slavery in New England*

December 8th

- Join Joanne Pope Melish as she exposes the forgotten history of slavery in New England and discusses the concept of "race" in American history. The workshop will also explore exercises and resources that engage students in this topic in the classroom.

JOANNE POPE MELISH is Associate Professor of Nineteenth Century U.S. History at the University of Kentucky. She is the author of *Disowning Slavery: Gradual Emancipation and 'Race' in New England, 1789-1860* (Cornell, 1998). She has received several awards, among them a National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowship. Professor Melish has served as a consultant to the Brown University Steering Committee on Slavery and Justice, and to the Rhode Island Council for the Humanities.

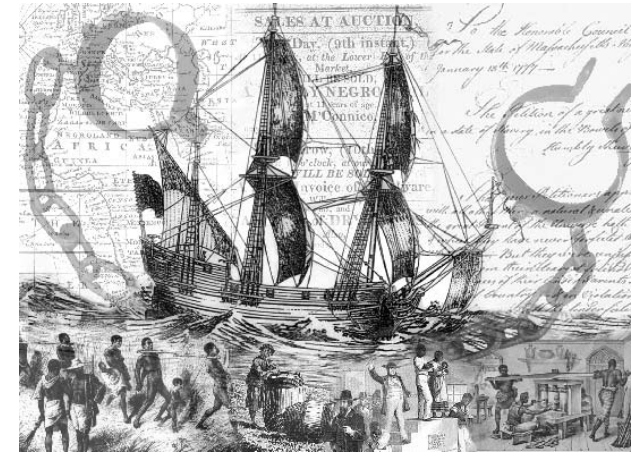
