

## Instruction for Using Google Earth

Political and Ethnolinguistic Maps of Europe—Using Google Earth This Google Earth file has overlays of the ethnolinguistic and political maps of Europe in 1914 and the political map of Europe in 1919.

This map can be used in conjunction with the Day Two lesson in *To End All Wars: World War I and the League of Nations Debate*. Teachers may also want to use these maps to show the changing political boundaries after the Paris Peace Conference.

Before opening the downloaded file, make sure you have Google Earth open. If you do not have Google Earth, you can download it for free at <[earth.google.com](http://earth.google.com)>

### To View the Political and Ethnolinguistic Borders:

**In the Layers panel on left:** Select “Terrain.” De-select all other subcategories.

**In the Places panel on left:** Expand “Versailles.kmz.” (Hint: Double clicking on the word “Versailles” will move the map to Europe.) You will find three subcategories “Europe 1914,” “Ethnolinguistics,” and “Europe 1919.” Selecting and then deselecting them one at a time will allow you to see the changing borders in Europe. Zoom in and out to explore.
